

Why Chicago Matters

Chicago is a great American city with a lot going for it. I say “American” because Chicago is very much the vision of how we have built cities over the past decade. In the late 1800’s the city was largely destroyed by fire and Chicago has essentially rebuilt itself from scratch over the last 100 years or so. In the early 1900’s, noted city planner and architect Daniel Burnham authored The Chicago Plan to shape the redevelopment and expansion of Chicago. It is one of the most comprehensive and over-arching city planning documents ever completed for an American city. Many elements of Burnham’s plan have been implemented and Chicago is an attractive city in a lot of aspects. It does in fact feel very “planned” and logically organized, thus making it easy to visit and get around. It has one of the great urban park systems in the world and has utilized its waterfront in a beautiful way. Millennium Park is probably the most well known urban park of the past couple of decades and is a great example of how to create active and meaningful public space. In many ways, because of the opportunity to “build new”, Chicago is the centerpiece of American architecture. Many architectural and engineering innovations, especially related to high-rise construction, are rooted in Chicago. However, this also led to some undesirable characteristics. Modern and post-modern architects that were active in Chicago were notoriously uninterested in the public realm. Some parts of Chicago seem very institutional and plain. Chicago has mass transit, but it is underwhelming for a city of this size and is not connected to large parts of the city. While there are many positives, and some negatives, the best thing is that Chicago does care deeply about itself as a city and planning, design and architecture are valued. The Chicago Architecture Foundation is a great community asset. It offers a variety of tours and a wonderful gift shop and it is the most comprehensive city architecture and design organization that I’ve ever seen. Chicago has many great restaurants and shops, but it does lack a certain grit, diversity or creativity as compared to some other great American cities. And then there is the weather. In a city with great parks and some outstanding “urban walks”, it can be very cold and windy for several months of the year so pay attention to when you visit.

Art Institute Chicago, new Modern Wing opened in May 2009
